

DALEY IS CREDITED WITH 13-4 VICTORY

Bombers Employ Their Favorite Weapon, the Home Run, to Defeat the Senators

Yank Pitcher Wilts in 9th—Mantle, Howard, Skowron Add Homers to Maris' 2

Behind a booming barrage of home runs that leveled the Senators yesterday, 13-4, the Yankees advanced to a striking post just one game short of first place in the American League standings.

After a day of rest, Manager Ralph Houk's explosive Bombers will open fire on that citadel tomorrow. They will meet the league-leading Tigers in a double-header that seems likely to fill Yankee Stadium.

In their final dress rehearsal, the Yankees put on a smashing show for a modest Sunday crowd of 19,794. With the reactivated Roger Maris connecting for Nos. 29 and 30, they jolted the ball out of the Stadium five times.

The two homers by Maris, good for four runs, put the slugging right fielder eight games and twelve days ahead of Babe Ruth's record home run pace. When the Babe hit sixty in 1927, he didn't get No. 30 until the Yankee's eighty-third game, on July 12. This was the seventy-fifth game for the current Bombers.

No. 28 For Mantle

Mickey Mantle, on a fifteen-game hitting streak, blasted his twenty-eighth homer, with one on, and kept close to Maris in their torrid race for major league leadership.

Elston Howard and Bill Skowron also each reached the stands with a teammate aboard. On his eighth-inning wallop, Skowron achieved the distinction of becoming the first player to hit three homers into the distant left-field bleachers at the Stadium.

All Yankee runs except three resulted from homers. The hit that accounted for two of the three did not suffer by comparison in muzzle velocity and range, only in direction. It was a double by Bob Cerv that dented the bleacher screen above the 457-foot mark in left center.

The beneficiary of this clouting was Bud Daley, on whom such largesse seldom was bestowed in Kansas City. Even so, the left-handed knuckleball exponent could not quite go the distance.

He wilted in the heat in the ninth inning. Playing it safe, Houk got Daley out after Bud had walked the first Washington batter and had been clipped for hits by the next two. Luis Arroyo finished without further notable events.

As in the previous two games of the series, the Senators scored first, on Gene Green's double and a single by Dale Long in the second. Yankee retribution against Pete Burnside was swift.

In the bottom of the second, after Mantle had drawn the first of four consecutive walks, Howard lashed the ball into the left-field upper deck.

After Washington had picked up another run in the third, the Yankees struck back again. Following walks to Daley and Tony Kubek, Maris hit a towering poke that glanced off the upper segment of the screen affixed to the right-field foul pole.

Johnny Klippstein, who relieved Burnside, contained the Bombers until the seventh. Then they erupted again. Maris crashed a lead-off homer against the facade of the right-field upper deck. Mantle walked Howard singled and Cerv hit his big double, scoring later on a single by Billy Gardner.

The eighth produced another four-run Yankee outburst. After a single by Kubek, Mantle lofted the ball into the right-field upper deck and, after a single by Howard, Skowron hit a drive to left that carried over the bullpen exit into the bleachers.

Ford and Mossi Paired

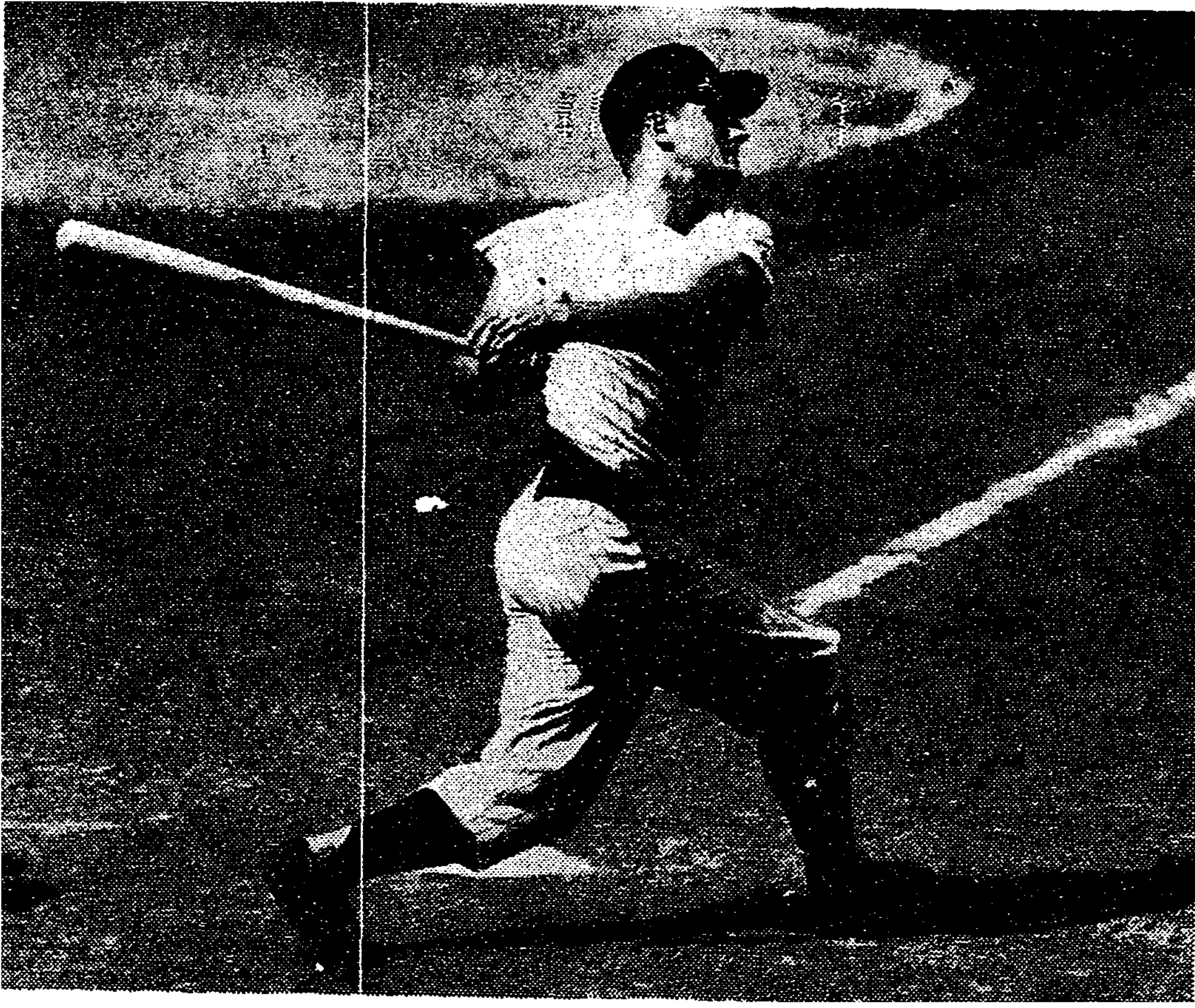
Whitey Ford and Bob Turley have been nominated by Houk to pitch against the Tigers. Bob Scheffing, Detroit's manager, wired from Baltimore that he would use Don Mossi and Frank Lary. He specified that Mossi would be matched against Ford.

After cutting loose in pre-game practice, Cletis Boyer, the Yankees' regular third baseman, declared himself ready for action. Ralph Terry, the Yankees' other sore-shoulder case, will be available for pitching duty by the end of the week.

The Yankees passed the half-million mark in home attendance. The count to date at the Stadium is 507,415.
